Season Greetings from the Swedish Consulates in Houston and Dallas!

Before you apply to renew your Swedish passport, you have to know . . .

- The Swedish Consulates in Houston and Dallas can no longer handle applications to renew regular Swedish passports or first-time applications for Swedish passports. You can apply in person at the Consulates General in New York and Los Angeles and at the Swedish Embassy in Washington.
- Child applicants who were born abroad and have never before had a Swedish passport must first be added to the Swedish population register by applying for a coordination number. This application can be filed at all Swedish consulates in the U.S.
- before you apply for a new passport, you need to update the registration at Folkbokföringsenheten, Skatteverket, in Sweden! This is necessary, even if you have received new Swedish passports in your new name. Contact your Tax Office and check how you are registered:

Swedish Immigration History at Williamson County Historical Museum

What did the first Swedish Texans experience when they set foot on Texas and Williamson County soil? Why did they come to Texas? What hardships did they face? How did they handle the "mild" Texas climate?

Assisted by The Texas Swedish Pioneers Association (TSPA), the Williamson County Historical Museum in Georgetown, Texas, will answer these and many more questions with its newest exhibit, *From Småland, Sweden, to Big Land Texas*. News from Sweden (from Swedish Council of America's December 2007 eUPDATE)

- → The Swedish Travel and Tourist Industry Federation (Rese- och Turistnäringen i Sverige) and public players are cooperating on a new venture. The parties have agreed to develop Sweden Door-to-Door (http://www.doortodoor.se/), the world's first national travel service for the general public, making Swedish tourism more accessible by ensuring that all travel can be booked through a single channel.
- → World's largest moose to be built in northern Sweden. When completed, the 148 foot tall, 155 foot long moose will have a restaurant in its belly, as well as a concert hall, conference rooms and a shop. Work on the \$9.4 million project is expected to be completed by the end of 2009. Until then take a virtual tour of "the King of the Forest" at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=t6P8Tuls-KA.
- → **Sweden's parliament** has voted in favor of abolishing the country's wealth and property taxes in 2008 following proposals presented by the centerright government earlier this year. Read more at http://www.thelocal.se/9438/20071218/.

Arn - The Knight Templar

A historical drama featuring valiant knights and love intrigues hits Swedish movie theaters this winter. With an estimated budget of \$30 million, Arn - The Knight Templar (Arn - Tempelriddaren), is the most expensive film production ever in Swedish history. The movie is based on the controversial author and journalist Jan Guillou's much celebrated crusades trilogy about the Knight Templar Arn Magnusson.

In the 12th century, Arn Magnusson, the son of a local high-ranking nobleman, grows up in a monastery at which he receives stellar academic education and becomes a skilled swordsman. At the age of 17, Arn leaves the monks and returns home. In a time when religion and social classes dictate life, relationships between the aristocracy and the common people are unthinkable. As a classic example of forbidden love, Arn soon falls in love with a beautiful girl of simple descent (Cecilia). To complicate things further, he also has a brief

love encounter with her sister Katarina after a night of heavy drinking. Upon discovering this misstep, the church deports Arn to the Knight Templars in the Holy Land to do 20 years of penance. Eventually, Arn returns to Sweden to accomplish two missions

While hardly unique, the plot quickly unfolds and effectively invokes feelings of both excitement and pity. Some critics argue that the combat scenes are too conventional and grumble on the lack of details, but enthusiasts praise the magnificent scenery and the romantic story. However, the average grade from the media appears to be a B—. The Internet Movie Database shows a user rating of 6.6/10 based on 850 cast votes.

In the list of actors, Stellan Skarsgård (*Good Will Hunting*, *Pirates of the Caribbean*) stands out as the one enjoying most international recognition. Other actors worth noting are Bibi Andersson (*I Never Promised You A Rose Garden*) playing the wicked Mother Rikissa and Sven-Bertil Taube (son of legendary songwriter Evert Taube) portraying a cryptic bishop.

Most of the Nordic scenes were recorded in the province of Västergötland (Arn's place of birth), whereas the foreign scenes were shot in Morocco and Scotland. Many of the Swedish villages and battlefields mentioned in the book (movie) can be visited in real life. In fact, several of the communities in Västergötland co-financed the production, hoping it would attract more tourists to the region. After the publication of the book trilogy, the region experienced an upswing in tourism (400,000 in 2002) and soon museums, guided tours and festivals on the Arn theme sprung up. These attractions have been further refined and expanded to capitalize on the expected increase in interest generated by the movie.

The book trilogy has been divided into two parts for the film production. Tentatively, the second part will be released in fall 2008. In addition, the Swedish Film Institute also plans a 6-hr DVD/TV release (in Swedish) with extended scenes. All American fans who are unable to travel to Sweden to witness Arn's adventures will have to wait until 2009 when the two Swedish parts will be combined into one English (international) version. This delay provides an opportunity to read Guillou's three novels. In Sweden, the trilogy has been immensely popular and sold over 2.2 million copies. English translations are available online.
