My Travels to Sweden by Lauren Garde *Lucia 2011*

My adventures in Sweden began in Stockholm. My parents, Tim & Jill Garde; my sister Sarah; my mormor Sally Anderson; my farbror Ken Garde and I arrived on a Friday morning to Arlanda airport where we boarded the Arlanda Express train to Stockholm's Central Station. After a crazy taxi ride through Gamla Stan, our cabbie finally was able to point us in the right direction to our hostel where we dropped our bags and began our walking tour of Gamla Stan. We began with a walk around the Royal Palace. We toured the Royal Apartments and were amazed by the grandeur and beauty of the Palace. We then headed to a small café in Gamla Stan for lunch before returning to our hostel to meet up with our friends John, Edie, Maren and James Stavinoha. John and Edie, who lived in Sweden for more than a year, served as our tour guides for our trip through Sweden.

We spent 3 days in Stockholm enjoying the sights. We ate ice cream in Kings Park, took the ferry to Gröna Lund and the Vasa ship museum, had lunch in the Saluhall Market, and shopped in Gamla Stan and in the Gallerian shopping mall. We even had time to have fish pedicures...something that is not typically available in the US. Our time in Stockholm was wonderful. We enjoyed the look and feel of the city, and it was hard to leave knowing there was so much more to do and see. But we traveled on...

On Monday we drove to Linköping. Driving in the countryside of Sweden is beautiful. The forest reminded me of the forest in Pennsylvania, and all of the red and yellow farmhouses were picturesque. In Linköping, we toured the Cathedral and walked through the city's beautiful gardens. We enjoyed time shopping and relaxing in the city's main square.

We also paid an unexpected visit to Inga Lisa Calissendorff. Inga Lisa was very happy to see the group from Texas and to see the Lucia tradition continue. The following day we shopped and learned how to make rope in Gamla Linköping; visited the locks of Berg on the Göta Canal; and toured the Air Force Museum and its exhibit of the DC-3 that disappeared.

On Wednesday we traveled south of Jönköping to the summer home of John's college roommate, Håkan Svensson. Håkan and his family treated us to a wonderful brunch, which included homemade Kanelbullar. Håkan was instrumental in helping me write my Lucia speech, so I took this opportunity to practice my pronunciation and made some last minute changes. We were then off to drop our bags at our next logging before heading to Varberg to meet my mormor's second cousin Ingrid. We found Ingrid through some relatives that live in California, and it was the first time meeting Ingrid and her family. That evening we walked along the coast of the North Sea and then later enjoyed dinner and a concert by the popular artist Miss Li. The concert was incredible and our visit with Ingrid helped me to feel more connected with Sweden and my ancestors.

We spent the next two days relaxing at a wonderful bed and breakfast, Lydde Gård Guest House, in Kinna. There we borrowed the guesthouse bikes and explored the quaint town and its surroundings. I played a round of golf with my father, Uncle Ken and James. Staying in Kinna allowed my family to visit nearby Hajom Parish and its church where my mormor's farmor was baptized. The Church of Hajom dates back to the end of the 12th century. It features beautiful ceiling paintings that date back to 1775 and a baptismal font from the 1100s. There is also a freestanding bell tower just outside of the church. We were lucky enough to run into the grounds-keeper, and he opened both the bell tower and the church so that we could see all of the unique features.

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On Friday we took a day-trip to Göteborg to visit the Stavinoha's former au pair Joanna. We spent the afternoon walking in Göteborg and having lunch with Joanna and her daughter.

On Saturday it was off to Barkeryd. We met Anita and Pelle Johansson at the church in Barkeryd and then followed them to their home for a tasty lunch. Anita explained the Barkeryd-Texas connection and the history of the Barkeryd candlestick. We all enjoyed eating fresh strawberries straight from Anita's garden and cherries from their tree. We walked down the road to pick elder flowers...Edie is going to try to use them in a snaps recipe! Later that evening we joined a group of locals at the home of Benny & Marianne Westerholm for a delicious bar-b-que. After dinner we all took part in a game of Kubb. Kubb is a traditional lawn game where the object is to knock over wooden blocks by throwing wooden sticks at them. Kubb can be simply described as a combination of bowling and horseshoes. Playing Kubb was fun for everyone.

The following day was the day of the festival. We began our day by picking up Inga Lisa at the local train station and then heading to Anita's for a quick lunch before the parade. My parents, my sister and I all walked with Anita and Pelle in the parade. The parade was full of music and antique farm equipment. Alf Carlsson introduced everyone in the parade and then offered the crowd a toast with a cider before the program started. I was one of the first to be called on stage. Anita introduced me, and I was able to give a somewhat understandable speech in Swedish. After my speech I was presented with a certificate from the Vasa Order of Jönköping for upholding Swedish traditions in the US and the symbolic Barkeryd candlestick. We spent the remainder of the day enjoying all of the food and festivities. The people of Barkeryd were wonderful, and they made us all feel welcome.

Our next and last stop was Malmö. While in Malmö, we took the train to Lund where we visited the University of Lund, runestones and the cathedral's grand astrological clock, which puts on quite a show when it chimes once a day.

Our trip concluded with a train ride to the Copenhagen airport over the incredible Öresund Bridge.

My trip to Sweden was my first trip ever to Europe. It was amazing! I enjoyed everything about Sweden...the people, food, country, shopping and friends. I have been introduced to a new culture. This trip has brought me closer to my Swedish roots and has sparked a new interest in exploring Swedish traditions. I hope one day to return to Sweden to discover more of what it has to offer.

I would like to thank the Swedish Club of Houston and Margaret St. Clair for supporting the Lucia program. I would also like to thank Anita & Pelle Johansson and Benny & Marianne Westerholm for their hospitality during our stay in Barkeryd, and many thanks to the people of Barkeryd for making my trip so special. 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The Game of Kubb "Viking Chess"



Kubb, sometimes called "Viking chess" is an outdoor lawn game popular in Sweden with a long running history. The game is said to have been invented during Viking times, but no one can officially confirm the history. Regardless, it can be played by different age groups on a variety of playing surfaces. The game is played by two teams (1-6 people each) throwing wooden sticks underhanded at the opponent's blocks that are lined up on the opposite side of the field. Once you have properly knocked down your opponent's pieces, you must hit the king that resides in the center of the field. The first team to knock down all opposing blocks and the king wins.

Kubb has become incredibly popular in the Midwestern United States over the past five years. Some universities have their own clubs and the city of Eau Claire, Wisconsin hosts the US championships each year.
